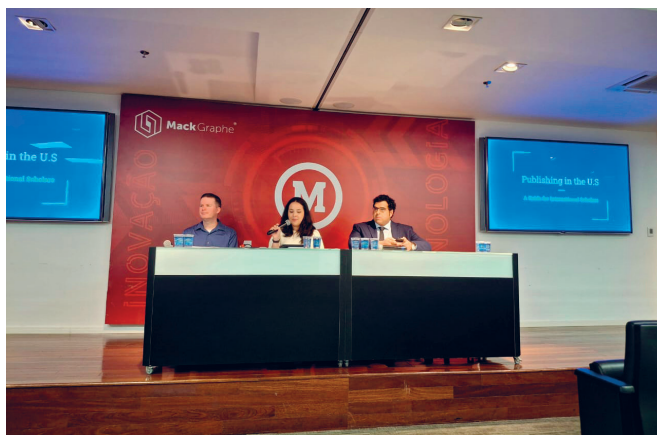
The final edition of Volume 18 of the *Revista Direito Mackenzie* (RDM) reflects ongoing efforts toward internationalization, which have significantly increased the journal's visibility. Among the highlights are the availability of bilingual publications, facilitating access for international readers, and the growing participation of foreign authors in published articles.

At the end of the second semester of 2024, RDM supported the organization of two scientific events at the Higienópolis campus of Mackenzie Presbyterian University. These events aimed to promote discussions about academic publishing systems in different international contexts.

The first event featured Professor Michael McArthur from Duke University, who delivered a lecture titled *Publishing in the US: A Guide for International Scholars*. The second event was led by Professor Bruce Wardhaugh from Durham University in the United Kingdom, who shared his experience as editor-in-chief, discussing specific aspects of the European model.
