

## PRESENTATION

The Mackenzie Law Review (*Revista Direito Mackenzie - RDM*) presents, at the conclusion of this third issue of volume 19, an overview of the activities carried out throughout 2025. Compared with previous years, this was a period of significant growth and consolidation of our editorial practices. We recorded a substantial increase in the number of submitted articles (140 manuscripts), a direct indicator of the academic community's confidence in the journal's quality and scientific rigor. We also highlight improvements in the management of the double-blind review process: we reached an average of 18 days for the first editorial decision, a timeframe that reflects the care devoted to the initial assessment and our ongoing pursuit of efficiency and transparency.

Throughout the year, *RDM* also supported initiatives held by the Mackenzie Presbyterian University School of Law, contributing to the strengthening of research and academic publishing activities. Notable among these was the institutional presentation of the journal during the School of Law's Research Week, as well as our active participation in the 32<sup>nd</sup> National CONPEDI Congress, held at the end of the semester at Mackenzie Presbyterian University. These events reinforce our commitment to the qualified dissemination of legal knowledge and the continuous dialogue among researchers, faculty, and students.

In this final issue of the year, we reaffirm our commitment to internationalization and to expanding contemporary legal debates by maintaining the publication of bilingual articles, featuring contributions from both Brazilian and foreign scholars aligned with our editorial scope.

We express our gratitude to all who contributed to another year of growth for the *Revista Direito Mackenzie*: authors, reviewers, members of the editorial board, and our readers. We wish you an excellent reading of this final issue of 2025 and hope it inspires new reflections and research within the field of Law.
